

It's test day! Afterwards, you'll be given a physical copy of your unofficial score report. Official scores will be sent electronically to school(s) by ADA.

Applying for the OAT (oat.ada.org)

- 1. Register for a PIN
- 2. Make an account using PIN
 - a. Make sure the name you enter corresponds to the name on your ID (DL or passport)
- Apply for OAT Examination you'll receive an email within a week if you're eligible
- Receive an Eligibility ID through email that you MUST keep track of
 - a. This ID is used to register to take the OAT
- 5. Registering a day/time is done through Prometric.com

- 5. Prometric will email you for confirmation (check spam if not there)






OAT - Recommended Timeline

Focus
-Try not to work or work less
-Don't study when you have classes

Study
-Be disciplined and set time
-Be sure to take breaks (avoid burnout)

Environment
-Find a suitable study environment
-Find an OAT study group

Students usually take 3-4 months to study



Start Studying

Look over all the concepts and familiarize yourself with it. Take notes.

Absolutely nothing!

Finish Up Notes

Finish taking notes/watching videos and start going over them in chunks. Practice with single section exams.

Bought subscription, found how I liked to study.

Practice Exams

Start doing practice exams and get the timing down.

Continued to get familiar with topics & began practice exams

Light Review

Review the exam material and focus on areas of difficulty. Rest up!

Mostly did practice exams & focused on what I was getting wrong

- Race & Ethnicity
- Other Info (Military, Previous Graduate School Enrollment, etc.)

Letters of Recommendation

Minimum Requirement (UHCO):

- Academic Mentor
 - a professor, an advisor, a coach, or any other individual capable of speaking to the applicant's academic preparedness in regard to their professionalism, dedication, intuition, character, integrity, wisdom, teamwork, responsibility, humanity, etc.
- Licensed Optometrist
 - A minimum of 20 hours of direct optometric experience is also required from at least two settings (e.g., shadowing/work experience from two optometric practices, ideally in varying modalities)

**You may have up to 4 letters of recommendations

Tips:

- Pick a professor that you have/had a good relationship with (they need to remember you!!)
- Reach out to your professors 1-2 months prior to the cycle (AKA Summer)
 - o Introduce yourself (when you took the course, what grade you made)
 - Personalize it
 - Attach a resume for additional information (some might ask your your essay)

Who?

Practice with people who have gone through the interview process.

TIP:

 Say your answers out loud even if you're practicing by yourself

Criticism/Feedback

Listen to your mock interviewers' feedback as they are trying to help you improve!

When?

Start about a week before your interview.

TIPS:

- Look up practice interview questions
- Think of your answers ahead of time, but don't memorize (sounds like a script)

Take it seriously!

Answer as if it was your actual interview.

Developed

Well-thought out

Show some personality





Open v. Closed File

Interview Type

Interviews can be open file, closed file, or a mix of both!

Open File

Prepare for questions regarding your application as a whole.

Closed File

Prepare for questions more centric about yourself and your pathway to optometry.



TIP

Be prepared for the interviewer to ask follow-up questions based on a previous answer you've given.


Our Interview Advice:

- Practice, Practice!
- Remember why you're doing this
- Have confidence in yourself
 - You're trying to sell yourself
- Be ready for follow up questions
- Speak from the heart
 - OD schools want to know who you're a person, not just an academic robot
- It's not as bad as what you think it is



- Application Timeline

Overall Timeline



Mid May -Late Aug

<u>OAT</u>

- Study for the OAT for ~3-3.5 months
- Ideally, study during the summer
- Take OAT early to mid September

Application

- Begin asking for LORs ~May-June; send LOR links ASAP + email
- Start writing PS
- Submit application by late September to early October

Interview

- Practice for 1-2 weeks before the interview
- Do some mock interviews
- Interviews are usually offered 1 month after submitting everything

#1. Get an accountabilibuddy so they can make sure you're on track.

#2. It's okay if you take a couple of days to rest. Don't burn yourself out.

Ashlyn

#1: Set a schedule and stick to it!

#2: Don't compare yourself to others!

#1. Don't be discouraged if something doesn't go exactly as you planned.

#2. Set small goals

#1: Plan ahead with flexibility #2: Take it one step at a time. Don't try to do everything at once.

- How do you handle stress?

- What qualities do you think you possess to be a good optometrist?
- What qualities do you bring to the school?
- If you were accepted to multiple schools, how would you decide where to go?
- Why UHCO?
